West African Drum and Dance

Maria Young teaches West African Dance accompanied by live “dunun” and “djembe” drums from Guinea. She began studying 13 years ago in Santa Cruz and began teaching 7 years ago. She has taught at several dance centers, health clubs, schools, and community centers. She gives thanks to her teachers: Allasan Kane, Youssouf Koumbassa, and Djibril Camara. She encourages all ages and levels to celebrate life through this joyous and liberating dance.

Stories of Love from North Coast Storyteller Anita Punla

Anita was first introduced to the power of story in the early 1990's when she heard storyteller Clarissa Pinkola Estes speak on her book "Women Who Run with the Wolves". With the birth of her daughter She'ifa, she was motivated to find and tell stories of wisdom and enchantment. "I began storytelling in schools and the Eureka Library in 2000 with my program for children called "Drumming Up a Story". Storytelling is a way of gently sharing different perspectives from many cultures and generations, and has become a way of clarifying my own understandings. As a member of the Northcoast Storytellers, I welcome opportunities to give the gift of story."

The Quilting of Gee's Bend

Learn about the quilting of Gee's Bend from artist Lindsay Coats and create your own quilt. Special thanks to Brenda Lou Scott of Scottie Dog Quilts offering Quilting Fabrics, Supplies, Classes & Retreats! Gee's Bend is located in southwest Alabama on a sliver of land five miles long and eight miles wide, a virtual island surrounded by a bend in the Alabama River. Without a ferry service for decades, the residents were confined by the river unless they made the hour-long drive to the county seat of Camden, directly across the river from Gee's Bend. Gee's Bend was named after Joseph Gee, the first white man to stake a claim there in the early 1800s. The Gee family sold the plantation to Mark Pettway in 1845. Most of the approximately 750 people who live in Gee's Bend today are descendants of slaves on the former Pettway plantation. Their forebears continued to work the land as tenant farmers after emancipation, and many eventually bought the farms from the government in the 1940s. Isolated geographically, the women in the community created quilts from whatever materials were available, in patterns of their own imaginative design. Like many American quilters, the women transformed a necessity into a work of art....Cited from www.npr.org
